- 67,5 % of photos in the MuIS database (www.muis.ee)

Photos from the 19th century until 2012.





Use of photographic collection

Free-access photos – widely used.

90% of researchers use these photos both for study and business purposes.

 Photos in copyright – in use to small extent.





Soviet-period photographs

 Where and how do you find an author holding a valid copyright, if there is no detailed information about them?



Tartu City Museum has:

- usage right,
- ownership rights,
 - ... but does not hold a copyright on the museum objects.



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Material use agreement

as the museum's self-protection against possible litigations related to copyright issues.

According to the contract:

- legal responsibility in the issues relating to copyright lies with the customer.

Personal data in the museum's databases

- photographs
- documents
- diaries
- life stories
- case histories etc



Changes in museum work

paper era

Narrow circle of insider possess information about museum objects.

digital era

Information moves from museum's inventory books into Internet-based database.

Data selection has become essential.

But...Where does the general information end and the too personal information begin?
